If the answer is YES to any of these questions, keep them home and contact your healthcare provider for guidance to rule out COVID-19 or other illnesses/allergies. If positive for COVID-19, stay out of school until:

- 24 hours without fever with no fever reducing medications, AND
- Significant improvement in symptoms, AND
- 10 days have passed since symptoms first began

If your child is ill but not COVID-19 positive, download this to help determine when they can return to school.

If you answer "yes" to any of the symptoms listed above in section 1, at least two of the symptoms listed in section 2, OR your temperature is 100.4° F or higher, please do not go into work. Self-isolate at home and contact your primary care physician's office for direction.

- You should isolate at home for minimum of 10 days since symptoms first appear or per Saginaw County Health Department guidance.
 - o If diagnosed as a probable COVID-19 or test positive, call Saginaw County Health Department and make them aware of your diagnosis or testing status.
- You must also have 24 hours without fever (without use of fever reducing medications) and improvement in respiratory symptoms.

SCENARIOS to use when students, staff or teachers are positive for COVID-19

Scenario 1:

Teacher and students in a self contained classroom (elementary)

Covid-19 positive student/staff/ teacher

In self-contained classroom

The entire class including teacher and students in that classroom leave school and quarantine for 14 days.

Scenario 2:

Rotating teacher, no assignment of seats, teacher and student free to move around in class (middle and high school)

> Covid-19 positive teacher/staff

Who rotates to different classrooms



All classrooms that she/he taught quarantine for 14 days

Scenario 3:

Assigned seats, social distance (6 or more feet apart) teacher and student with limited movement

> Covid-19 positive teacher/staff

Who rotates to different classrooms



Those who are close contacts (less than 6 feet for at least 15 mins) quarantine for 14 days

Scenario 4:

Administration and staff (front desk/admin)

Covid-19 positive administration/staff With limited movement



Close contacts quarantine for 14 days






SCENARIOS to use when students, staff or teachers are positive for COVID-19

Bus considerations

- Group family members together
- Consider pre-screen prior to getting on the bus
- Parents should be educated that they (responsible adult) should be present when the student gets on the bus
- Sick students should not be allowed on the bus
- Windows slightly open to increase air flow








SCENARIOS to use when students, staff or teachers are positive for COVID-19

Isolation room recommendations

- Each sick student should be isolated in a separate room
 - Reduces risk of spread of disease
 - Students could have different disease
 - Flu
 - Common cold
 - Covid-19
 - Staff & child must wear surgical mask
 - Escort child to vehicle, do not allow parent to enter building




- Isolate the student
- Call parents to pick student up
- Student to stay home until symptoms resolve (at least 10 days, no fever for 24 hours, and symptoms improving) and/or see doctor for clearance to return to school
- If child tests positive, close contacts quarantine for 14 days

- Send adult home
- Stay home until symptoms resolve (at least 10 days, no fever for 24 hours, and symptoms improved) and/or see doctor for clearance to return to school
- If positive, close contacts go on quarantine (see other scenarios)

Dear Parents/Guardians:

This letter is to inform you that an individual at [school building and grade] has tested positive for COVID-19. The District is coordinating closely with the Saginaw County Health Department in order to assure the health and safety of our community.

We have performed contract tracing with the assistance of the Saginaw County Health Department and have identified all close contacts (less than 6 feet for at least 15 minutes) to this individual. We have contacted those families with quarantine instructions. If you have not been contacted your child is not a close contact of this individual and therefore your child is not required to quarantine.

Cleaning and disinfecting of all exposed areas has been completed. The school is also taking precautions to prevent the introduction and spread of viruses and other germs and is cleaning frequently touched surfaces daily. We understand the level of concern regarding COVID-19. We encourage parents and students to continue following the public health recommendations:

 - Watch your distance
- Covering coughs and sneezes and properly disposing of tissues;

Dear Parents/Guardians:

This letter is to inform you that your child has been identified as a **close contact** of a laboratory-confirmed case of COVID-19 that occurred at [school building] on [enter date(s) of exposure]. A close contact is defined as someone who was within 6 feet of a confirmed case of COVID-19 for at least 15 minutes.

Due to this exposure, your child will need to be kept home from school through [14 days from date of last exposure]. We ask that you be on the lookout for the signs and symptoms of COVID-19 in your child through [that date]. Symptoms can include but are not limited to fever, cough, runny nose, shortness of breath, sore throat, headache, diarrhea, vomiting and abdominal pain. Not everyone will get all these symptoms. The Saginaw County Health Department (or health department of your county of residence) will also be in touch with additional information.

We encourage you to contact health care provider to discuss testing or management of any symptoms that develop. Should you want your child to be tested you can call 2-1-1 or your healthcare provider may order a test. Please note that even if your child tests negative for COVID-19 during the quarantine period he/she may NOT return to school until [Enter Date].

Cleaning and disinfecting of all exposed areas has been completed. The school is also taking precautions to prevent the introduction and spread of viruses and other germs and is cleaning frequently touched surfaces daily. The status of this situation is fluid, and we are monitoring it closely.

As always, we appreciate our community's support and cooperation. You can assist us by remaining vigilant but sensible in your approach to dealing with this health concern. Practice the **3 W**s (**W**ash your Hands, **W**ear a Mask, and **W**atch your Distance).





Contact your healthcare provider to rule out COVID-19 or other illnesses/allergies. If positive for COVID-19, stay out of school until:

- 24 hours without fever with no fever reducing medications, AND
- Significant improvement in symptoms, AND
- 10 days have passed since symptoms first began



Any time they are (or you suspect they are) exposed to COVID-19

Within six feet, for 15 minutes or more, with a confirmed COVID-19 person



STOP! STAY HOME!

Contact your healthcare provider about exposure and testing. If test comes back positive, stay home until:

- 24 hours without fever with no fever reducing medications, AND
- Significant improvement in symptoms, AND
- 10 days have passed since symptoms first began

If test comes back negative, stay home for a full 14 days as the incubation period for COVID-19 is 2-14 days and the disease may not be fully detected by testing if done early in the incubation cycle





If your child is exposed to COVID-19 and asked to

quarantine and self-monitor

You will be contacted either by the SCHD or a representative of the Michigan Department of Health & Human Services.

Your child will be asked to:

Stay home and quarantine for 14 days & you will monitor their symptoms twice per day [morning + night]

Monitor their health, twice daily

- Take their temperature twice per day and write it down
 - Must be at least 30 minutes after eating, drinking, or exercising
 - Wait 6 hours after taking medications which can lower your temperature (acetaminophen, ibuprofen, paracetamol, or aspirin)
 - Clean your thermometer with soap and water after each use
- Look for symptoms such as:
 - cough
 - difficulty breathing
 - sore throat
 - runny nose
 - fever

If they do have a fever of 100.4°F, cough, or trouble breathing:

If a child is experiencing a life-threatening emergency, call 911 immediately

- Call your doctor's office or urgent care facility BEFORE seeking care to discuss their symptoms and self-monitoring information
- Call the Saginaw County Health Department to inform them of your child's symptoms and that you are monitoring them at (989) 758-3828

COVID-19 SPREADS THROUGH CLOSE CONTACT

Protect the health & safety of others Practice good health habits while self-monitoring

- Practice the 3W's (wash your hands, wear a mask, watch your distance)
- If soap and water are unavailable, use a hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol
- Avoid close contact with others & do not share cups or eating utensils
- Disinfect high touch surfaces often
- Get plenty of sleep, eat nutritious food, drink plenty of fluids, be physically active, and manage stress


The 3 Ws: How to Best Protect Your Child When Returning to School

These three tried-and-true public health measures are you and your child's best protection against COVID-19 and all communicable diseases.

Remember to keep your children home whenever they are sick or potentially exposed to someone confirmed to have COVID-19.

This will help protect you and those you care about.



COVID-19 DECISION TREE →

Known exposure to COVID-19

(15 minutes or longer within 6 feet)

Does the student have any of the following symptoms: fever, chills, sweating, sore throat, new cough, diarrhea, vomiting, abdominal pain, new onset of severe headache – especially with a fever or runny nose

Does the staff member exhibit any one of the following symptoms: cough, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, new olfactory disorder, new taste disorder **OR** at least two of the following symptoms: fever (measured or subjective), chills, rigors, myalgia, headache, sore throat, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea, fatigue, congestion or runny nose



- 14 day quarantine
- Active symptom monitoring (e.g., take temp 2x/day and watch for symptoms)



Staff to safely isolate student and coordinate dismissal with instructions to follow up with HCP

Students or staff who have symptoms consistent with COVID-19 will be denied entry or dismissed. See below to determine when they may return.



- If a growing percentage of the student population tests positive, the Saginaw County Health Department would seek CDC quidance and possibly reccommend 2-5 day closure if the exposre is not contained
- School staff and administrators to perform contact tracing
- May receive other guidance from Health Department as necessary

FAQ Info for Parents

COVID-19 is still spreading in Saginaw County — which means it is still a threat to health. We care about you and your family's health as much as education. So, while the virus is still new, we have worked with your school district, as well as state and federal partners, to give you the best information we have as we prepare to return to school in the fall.

What steps can we take to prepare our children for school and prevent them from getting COVID-19?

- Check your own thoughts and attitudes

 if you are negative about school, they
 probably will be too. Instead, reassure them
 that everyone is working together to make
 their return to school as safe as possible.
- Help them wash their hands often and correctly
 with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- Help them avoid close contact with people who are sick, even inside your own home.

- Help them comprehend what six feet apart means
 use pool noodles, a measuring tape, etc.
- Practice wearing masks start for short periods of time and work your way up.
- Show them how to cover their sneezes and coughs correctly.
- Teach them to use hand sanitizer and wipes to clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces daily.
- Help your student monitor his or her health look for symptoms and take their temperature every morning.

What if my student comes in "close contact" with a teacher, staff member or other student who has COVID-19 at school?

Know that COVID-19 is everywhere in the community. Every time you go out of the home, you and your children are at risk for getting exposed. That said, schools are working to create the safest possible experience. This includes handwashing, social distancing, reducing shared items, masks, keeping classes in the classroom more, and limiting movement within the school building.

If your child IS exposed to someone with COVID-19 at school, they should stay home for 14 days since the last time they were around that person to see if they develop symptoms. If they do get symptoms, then:

- Call your doctor
- Ask to get tested

 Follow your doctor's instructions for staying home while you wait for the test results

If you have other children in your home, who do not have symptoms, they may continue to go to work and school. If the child who was in close contact gets sick, then your other students should stay home too.



• What if my student develops symptoms at school?

If your child experiences symptoms AT school, they will immediately isolate them from others in a designated room and call you. You will then need to call your doctor, ask to get tested, and follow your doctor's instructions.

How will I know if my student was around someone who was sick?

Your school has a system they developed with us to do contact tracing. They will call you if your student was a close contact to a positive case. We will follow up with you. Your school will communicate with the school community to let people know that there is a positive case and how they are handling it.

Will schools close if someone gets COVID-19?

We hope that isn't necessary. We are helping your school create an environment that allows them to better control how students and classrooms move within the building. By limiting movement, we hope they have the ability to deal with isolating smaller groups of children rather than disrupting the entire school.

School will work with the Saginaw County Health Department to determine when and if school closure is necessary.

But rest assured your student's safety, and the safety of school staff, are everyone's highest priority.

Contact Tracing

Schools have unique responsibilities as both an employer to staff and teachers <u>and</u> as a service provider to students and families.

Schools should have policies and procedures in place so they are prepared to respond quickly upon receiving notification that a staff member, volunteer or student tested positive for COVID-19. These procedures will ensure that districts can confidentially notify families who have been exposed and that facilities are disinfected in a timely manner. The steps recommended below will allow the health department to provide robust contact tracing and are intended to help schools take necessary safety precautions while awaiting further information from the health department.

01

Upon receiving notification that

someone within the school has tested positive for COVID-19, immediately **contact the local health department** of the county where the staff member, volunteer or student lives (their county of residence). If Saginaw, please call the Saginaw County Health Department at (989) 758.3887. You will need to disclose the identity of the person, their address, date of COVID-19 diagnosis, and dates of attendence (dating back 2 days, or 48 hours, from the date of diagnosis).

02

Immediately determine whether the staff, volunteer or student has had contact with others. If possible, ask the staff, volunteer or student to identify who he/she has come into contact with over the past 2 days.

03

The health department can help assist you in determining close contacts.

Close contact is generally considered someone who has had less than 6 feet distance with a staff, volunteer or student for more than 15 minutes.



04

Notify families and other staff who may have come into contact with the positive staff, volunteer or student within the past 2 days that they may have been exposed to COVID-19, and may wish to see a healthcare provider. The

health department may have guidance as to whether home quarantine or self-monitoring are required based on the level and nature of exposure. The following language can be used to notify those who have been exposed:

a. As we continue to work through the COVID-19 pandemic, one of our many priorities includes the health and safety of our staff, volunteers and students. Therefore, you are receiving this notice because you have been identified as someone who has been in close contact with a teacher, staff member or other student within the school who has tested positive for COVID-19. Out of abundance of caution, we want to notify you as a precautionary measure so that you can monitor your health for the next 14 days and seek advice from your healthcare provider.

You may also communicate your cleaning protcol and social distancing mitigation strategies to alleviate fears and concerns.

05

Those identified as close contacts of the confirmed positive case should be sent home for a 14-day quarantine period, even if they test negative for COVID-19. Notify

these people that they will be receiving contact directly from their local health department or designee to perform daily monitoring with them. Daily monitoring will entail having them take their temperature twice daily and report any signs and symptoms. If they develop symptoms, they should not return to school until they have gone 72 hours without a fever without using fever-reducing medications, respiratory symptoms have improved, and 10 days have gone by since symptoms first appeared. Quarantined teachers and students may still participate in virtual learning, if available.

06

Determine where the confirmed positive case was within the building(s) and apply cleaning and disinfection protocols, or arrange for a professional cleaning of the classroom and common spaces.
